### FROM YOUR MAYOR

### **Dear Residents:**

Earlier this summer I performed a marriage ceremony in Watchung for a couple from out of town. They commented that they and their family thought Watchung Borough Hall would be a great place for the ceremony, followed by picture-taking around our beautiful Watchung Lake. It is great to be reminded of all that our borough has to offer; there is great pride in the joy our town brings; and it is nice once in a while to "show off" our town!

And we continue to make strides to improve upon our scenic town. Our Traffic and Beautification Committee and Public Works are responsible for the beautiful plantings around the circle, as well at Borough Hall. Recently dead trees and brush around Watchung Lake were removed, creating additional views of the lake. The Texier House, also on the circle (the home of Watchung's Historical Museum), is being repaired and repainted. And our plans are to complete irrigation and plantings on the islands along Somerset Street.

While on the subject of Somerset Street, unfortunately the large hole currently at Spratford Park (by the "Watchung" sign) is the result of a spill from the neighboring gas station. Efforts are underway to clean up the spill and restore borough property (gas station to make full restitution).

Around the circle on the Green, we are happy to report that great progress is being made on the 9/11 Memorial. The concrete base of our monument was poured in June, and as of the end of July a very gifted hired artisan has started to create the final monument. Our hopes are to have all but the walkway completed by this year's memorial service.

As many of you may have heard, the Colorado Café closed its doors in July after 22 years. We greatly appreciate the strong sense of community and relationships the owners of the Colorado built with their customers and our residents. The Café provided memorable times for many.

I have been asked many times in the last month to "save the painting!" – the large "Legend of Watchung" mural on a 16'x10' canvas – hanging in Sears on Route 22. For over 50 years, this painting has been on the store's walls. Unfortunately, after being reviewed by several art experts, it is believed that it will be very expensive if not impossible to successfully preserve and remove the very thin canvas painting from the masonry wall. All ideas have been considered; as a contingency, the painting is to be professionally photographed for potential reproduction at a later date. Several retail stores are being proposed to be built on the Sears property scheduled for demolition in October. The Sears Auto Center across the street also will be torn down, potentially replaced with a 10 theater movie complex.

Affordable Housing continues to be an important topic to Watchung and its neighboring communities across New Jersey. Every town faces large commitments of low and moderate income housing, the result of State judicial decisions reinforced once more in 2015 in conjunction with Fair Share Housing demands for the construction of additional state-mandated low and moderate income housing – even in built-out suburban and rural areas like Watchung. Although our options are limited, we continue to evaluate any alternatives to comply in order to avoid very consequential "builders' remedy" law suits.

The aerial deer survey conducted earlier this year revealed an estimated 165 deer (not including this spring's births) within the boundaries of Watchung, an average of 27 per square mile versus the State recommended 20 per square mile for an uncompromised understory. The Mayor and Council have established a workshop date of September 28th at 7 pm at Borough Hall to understand varying opinions and to hear from various experts on the environment and deer management practices.

Similarly, the Mayor and Council would like to conduct a workshop in October on the Watchung Library, to hear and express opinions regarding next steps to be taken. I continue to believe that providing a modern library/community center facility within town is a basic service that should be expected by its residents – especially one of Watchung's affluence – and that more than just viewed as a "cost", a library is an *invest*ment in our town and in our residents. A library serves residents of any age, and this investment, along with schools and park land, serves well to keep our home assessed values strong and competitive with other towns.

In June the PBA came to an agreement with the Mayor, Council and Administration on a 4-year contract through 2020. All sides are perceived to be pleased with both the negotiations and the results. Given the ever-increasing role and importance of our police officers in our community, I personally am very satisfied and appreciative of efforts to reach a fair settlement.

The County at the end of May was performing a traffic study and other analyses regarding Hillcrest Road; the residents will hopefully see a few changes being made in the near future. A contract was awarded by the Mayor and Council for improvements to Valley Drive and that work could be completed by the end of August; \$175,000 in State NJDOT funding paid for about 40% of these expenses. In July a bid was awarded for roadway improvements to Washington Drive; that work is expected to be completed in the next few months, and for this project \$223,500 was awarded to the Borough by NJDOT, financing about 60% of the work. Other roads being worked on include Acorn Road, Glenview Drive, Crestwood Drive, Scott Drive (portion of), and Winter Lane (portion of).

As a reminder, the Farmers' Market continues every Sunday through October 15th (10AM-2PM) in the parking lot by Best Lake. Our September 11th (Patriot Day) Memorial Service will take place at 5:30 pm on September 11th at the Village Green.

Have a great end of the summer.

### LYME DISEASE

Lyme disease is transmitted through the bite of an infected tick. The ticks are often found on the body in the groin area, armpits, and scalp. Typical symptoms of Lyme disease are fever, headache, fatigue and sometimes a skin rash that looks like a bull's eye. The good news is that Lyme disease is preventable. It is preventable because ticks need to be attached to you for a fairly long time for them to transmit the disease.

To prevent Lyme disease:

- Remove tick habitats (high grass and weeds).
- Avoid walking in wooded, bushy areas with high grass or leaves and when walking in the woods, walk in the center of the trails.
- Use an insect repellent that contains at least 20% DEET when outdoors.

Perform "tick-checks" regularly (at least daily) to prevent ticks from attaching and follow the steps below to remove identified ticks.

Use a fine-tipped tweezers and grasp tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull upward with a steady, even pressure.

After removing tick, thoroughly clean the bite.

If you feel that you have been exposed to Lyme disease, please contact your physician.



### PET WASTE

The Health Department continues to receive complaints of pet waste not being picked up and being left on the ground. This is a violation of local ordinances. It also represents a public health hazard to humans and pets as it can transmit disease. For the health and enjoyment of all, please clean up after your pet and be sure to wash your hands!

### **RABIES CLINIC**

The **Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission** will be offering multiple rabies clinics in the fall, one of which will be held in Watchung, tentatively scheduled as noted below. Please call to confirm the date and time in the fall. Rabies vaccination is the best defense for our pets. If your pet has been previously vaccinated the health department recommends that your dog or cat be vaccinated every other year. If your pet has not been vaccinated against rabies, now is the time. **The clinic is free to all.**

### NEWS FROM THE 9/11 COMMITTEE:

I'm sure most of our residents who travel around the circle have taken notice of some significant happenings that are going on. Aside from the Texier House getting a well-deserved exterior renovation and new paint, we are also well underway towards the completion of our 9/11 Memorial. This has certainly been long over-due, but we are happy to report that construction is going very well and we are on schedule to complete the Memorial by this year's 9/11 Ceremony at the Village Green, 5:30 PM September 11th - Rain or Shine.



This has been a Labor of Love for the many members of this Committee, both those that are currently serving as well as many others who have participated over the years. There have been many challenges along the way, but we are confident that the result will be something very different and very special for our residents.

We are very fortunate to have people in our town who are both talented and very generous with their time as well as their financial resources. It was always the Committee's intention that the project be completely funded through volunteer labor, and donations of funds as well as construction materials. Many business owners have stepped up to take part in the construction including PJ Panzarella, Weldon Materials and P&R Concrete, to name just a few. The three companies combined to complete phase one of the construction.

The committee has hired renowned masonry artisan contractor Richard Winget, who along with his son Jacob, will be completing the artistic details of the second phase of the project, under the direction of sculptor and resident Seth Alexander. We are also in the process of coordinating with a few landscaping contractors from town, who are volunteering to complete the beatification of the surrounding grounds. This should all be complete in time for our ceremony.

The final stage, which may not take place until the spring, will be the integration of the Monument's area to the existing walkway that goes around the Village Green.

Many residents have expressed their support of this project through the purchase of a Memorial Brick Paver. These are available in two sizes and are able to be imprinted with a custom message. These bricks will be used in the construction of the walkway that leads up to the Memorial area. We will be continuing to accept orders for bricks and donations until the final phase is complete. ### Texier House Museum, Watchung Historical Committee

Most of you are aware of the impending closing and demolition of the Sears store in Watchung. For most of the year, the Historical Committee has been researching the feasibility of removing our beloved mural of the Legend of Watchung and how to preserve and relocate it. For those of you who are unaware of this mural, it is a very large 16' X 10' oil painting on a thin canvas glued to the wall as you go down the stairs to the lower level. The artist was Garfield Hunter Jones (1925-1994) and known for his oil murals. The Sears store opened in 1965 so it was painted about that time. The mural is stunning and shows the Dutch Captain Michaleson, Chief One Feather and Princess Wetumpka, the key players in the Legend. The detail in the painting is remarkably preserved.

During our many visits to the mural with a variety of art experts, we learned that removing the painting will be a daunting and expensive task. We thought we had a time-table of at least a year or two, but now demolition could begin this fall, so as I write this article in July, we are really scrambling to try and save the mural. Not only is the mural a beautiful piece of art, it is an important part of the history of Watchung and is "so Watchung"! The Council has approved the funding (from the Historical Foundation) for a feasibility study by *Materials Conservation*, a company very experienced in preservation. This study will investigate the logistics of moving and relocating the painting and determine a cost. The cost is going to be considerable and could be \$50,000 or more. We will be actively fund raising very soon, so please consider donating to the Watchung Historical Committee. Your donation is tax deductible. We are exploring every avenue to save the mural. We have arranged for a professional photographer to take a photo of the mural in high resolution so that in a worst case scenario, we will have the image.

2017 is the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the United States entering WW I and the NJ State and County museums will all have WW I programs this year. We will also have special programming and exhibits at the Texier House. We are fortunate to have some wonderful WW I posters and plan to have them featured in our display. We do need more items for our WW I collection and will be grateful for any items donated or loaned.

The Historical Committee will be participating in the Somerset County Weekend Journey into the Past on October 14 and 15, 2017 and we expect many visitors from all of New Jersey. We expect the WW I exhibit to be a special feature as well as for the ceremony on Veteran's Day, Saturday November 11, 2017. Save the dates.

Barbara Diem, after many years of dedication and hard work for the Historical Committee, is stepping down from the Committee. Barbara, who spearheaded the War Memorial and was persistent in getting a home for Historical, and establishing the Museum, wants to spend more time with her family, her church, and her quilting. She will be sorely missed, but she promises to remain somewhat active. The Borough recognized Barbara's efforts with a proclamation at the July 20, 2017 Council Meeting. She has been appointed the first Life Member Emeritus.

The Historical Committee has been working with vacancies on the Committee. I am happy to report that Tim Logan, and Chrissy Blackadar have been appointed to the Committee. The Committee had asked the Borough for permission to add two alternate members to our roster and that resolution was passed. Shelini Parikh has been appointed Alternate 1. We still have a vacancy for a second alternate. If anyone is interested, please contact me. The summer will be spent orienting our new members. Since the opening of the Museum, the Committee has had a very active work schedule, so we welcome and need these new members.

The Texier House Museum is open the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month from 2-4 PM or by appointment. We continue to add exhibits and improve others. The Historical Committee will continue its mission to preserve and protect the history of Watchung. Please support our fund raising activities and visit the museum.

The continuation of the deer management program can only be approved and authorized by the Mayor and Borough Council; however, a management plan has been highly recommended by the Borough Wildlife Management Advisory Committee. Your cooperation is appreciated.



### **COMMUNITY PREPAREDNESS**



Our Borough's emergency managers, firefighters, law enforcement officers, EMT/paramedics, and other emergency responders do an incredible job of keeping us safe, but they cannot do it alone. We must all embrace our personal responsibility to be prepared – in doing so; we contribute to the safety and security of our community as well.

The **Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)** Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help.
