


MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Greetings from the Borough Council in this first newsletter of 2023!

Council is excited and energized to get to work on behalf of all residents and eager to share some recent news. Following the devastating events of September 2, 2021 when Storm Ida ravaged NJ and hit Watchung hard, the work quickly began to rebuild and repair. Through coordinated efforts with the Office of Emergency Management and numerous Borough departments, the weekly meetings and non-stop efforts working with FEMA have paid off. To date, Watchung was approved and will be receiving \$1,251,956.73 in relief funding and mitigation investment. The most notable change due to these efforts can be seen in the new Mobus Field Playground facility that opened this past October. This ADA compliant and state of the art facility brings a vast array of equipment to children of all ages and abilities in a safe environment that adds to the existing park.

We celebrate both the completed projects and those in the works. Completed projects include fence replacement, electrical upgrades, Carriage House repairs and a new brick patio at the Texier House in addition to repairs throughout the Borough. Projects slated for further improvement include various culverts and bridges.

Since responding to their first call on December 31st, 1950, the Watchung Rescue Squad has endured over 70 years of emergency response thanks to the countless dedicated volunteers who have committed their time to helping their community.

Meet Denise Wilson. A long time Watchung resident, Denise is a mother of two children, a few cats, and a dog named Maverick. Denise joined the Watchung Rescue Squad in April of 2011 and has moved through the ranks serving in multiple officer positions including 1st. Lieutenant and President. Upon joining, she attended EMT schooling while working a full time job and raising two young children. She quickly rose through the ranks, becoming a driver and then a Crew Chief. Throughout the past 11 years, every member who has walked through the doors of the Watchung Rescue Squad has been welcomed by Denise's friendly and exuberant personality. Residents will find Denise at Mobus Field during the Harvest Festival, handing out candy at the Trunk or Treat, standing at attention during the 9/11 ceremony and taking calls on Monday nights.

From her first shift in 2011, Denise has primarily rode on Monday nights with a determination to make her shift "the best shift of the week". She prides herself on consistently training not only her crew but all members at monthly drills. Through WRS, she has acquired her EMT and CPR certifications, became a CPR instructor, and now works as an EMT instructor as well. When she is not training, Denise can be found decorating the building for the nearest holiday or organizing a "Squaddie get together" for members to eat and have fun.

The Watchung Fire Prevention Bureau would like to share the following information to keep you and your family safe this Spring/Summer season.

Lithium-ion Batteries supply power to many kinds of the devices that we use every day. These devices include, smart phones, laptops, E scooters & bikes, toys and even vehicles.

The batteries that are included with these devices are relatively safe when used and maintained properly. These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small package. When not used as designed, these batteries can become dangerous.

The following Safety Tips are provided by The "National Fire Protection Association" to keep you safe when using, storing and charging Lithium-ion batteries.

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory like UL
- Always follow manufacturer's instructions
- Only use batteries designed for the device
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device
- Do not charge any device on a bed, pillow or couch
- Do not overcharge the device, disconnect the charging cord when complete
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible
- Do not charge batteries at Temperatures below 32 degrees or above 105 degrees
- Store batteries away from any combustible materials
- Never store batteries in hallways or exits



Stop using the battery/device if it shows signs of a problem

- Unusual odor
- Change in color
- Excessive heat
- Change in shape
- Leakage

If it is safe to do so, move the battery to the outside and call 911. Always have working smoke alarms within the living space of the home.

Remember to test your smoke alarms monthly! Enjoy the season and Be Fire Safe!

If you are in need, Watchung Fire Prevention Bureau has a limited number of 10-year sealed battery smoke alarms for distribution.

- The smoke alarms may be picked up from the Fire Prevention office during normal business hours.
- The name, address and phone number of the resident receiving the smoke alarm is required.
- One smoke alarm per resident please.

WATCHUNG POLICE DEPARTMENT

Hello Watchung Neighbors,

Our biggest crime issue impacting Watchung is the theft of unsecured motor vehicles. The State of New Jersey is facing a stolen vehicle epidemic which has not been seen since the 1980's. Motor vehicles are being stolen across the state at an astonishing rate. More than 14,300 vehicles have been stolen in New Jersey through November 2022, an increase of 9% from this same time last year, and 41% increase from 2020. Regrettably, Watchung has been victimized by these stolen vehicle crews. These crews target affluent neighborhoods and seek out vehicles where the key fob is left inside the vehicle. The stolen vehicle is then shipped overseas or used in other violent crimes which occur in other jurisdictions.

The Watchung Police Department has apprehended as well as assisted in prosecuting multiple crews, only for more to move into place.

We ask you to help up in trying to combat this crisis. Please **remove the key fobs** from all your vehicles, along with any valuables and personal effects. We also ask that you report any suspicious activity immediately. We want the opportunity to check out all suspicious activity as it could help us prevent another crime in progress.

Together we will keep Watchung safe!

NIXLE

To join the Watchung NIXLE you can send a text to 888777. In the text field just type Watchung and hit send. This will sign you up to receive Watchung Nixle text messages. You can ensure maximum access to Watchung Nixle messages by adjusting your settings online. You have to start by going to www.nixle.com.

You will need to click on Resident Login. It is located on the top right. If you have not logged in before you can select SIGN UP and enter your email and create a new password.

Once you have a login you can login and go to the settings tab. This will allow you to select how you would like to receive Advisory and Alerts. It is recommended to set them both for Text Notifications. Most notifications that Watchung sends out are Advisory messages.

WATCHUNG LIBRARY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Spring is a time for new beginnings and growth, and renewal is not only taking place in nature but at the Watchung Library as well! The Watchung Public Works staff repainted the second floor Bicentennial Meeting Room and hallway in February. The borough also arranged for installation of new carpet; in March, a brighter and refreshed Bicentennial Room will reopen. Library programs, such as children's story times and adult book discussions, will return as will Second Story Books, the ongoing used book sale sponsored by the Friends of Watchung Library. Patrons, non-profit organizations, and community members/groups may reserve the refurbished Bicentennial Room for meetings and activities. A valid SCLSNJ library card number and pin are required to reserve this space, and all groups must agree to the meeting room policy. Go to the sclsnj.org website and click on "Using Our Libraries" then "Meeting Rooms." The reservation process is simple and there is no charge to use the room.

Did you know that all Watchung residents are invited to suggest engaging programs they would like to see offered at the Watchung Library? Just go to sclsnj.org, click on "Programs and Events" along the top, then click on "Suggest a Program." You will be asked to describe the program and target audience. This process takes less than five minutes. Be aware that you will not receive confirmation regarding your submission. In addition, programs are planned four to six months in advance. Two exceptionally well-received programs took place at our library this past summer and fall. The patrons and supporters of the Watchung Library enthusiastically promoted these programs and the turnout was outstanding. These programs originated through the efforts of local volunteers and patrons–people just like you--who are brimming with ideas for new offerings. Are you a beekeeper? Scientist? Author? Expert gardener? Could you teach a class about photography or calligraphy or interior design? Help bring more exciting programs to our library by offering to lead a program or by making a suggestion for a program you'd like to see. Just go to the sclsnj.org website and make a request.

Exciting things are happening at the Watchung Library! If you are a new resident, stop by and sign up for a library card. It's free. If your Kindergarten student obtained his or her new card at the Back to School ice cream event last summer, bring him/her back to check out some spring-themed books or a craft project. Patrons are encouraged to pick up a Cultural Adventure Pass and enjoy free admission at dozens of cultural venues in the area. Customers experiencing temporary or permanent health, mobility, transportation, age related, or other qualifying barriers to visiting physical library locations can take advantage of the Home Borrowing Library Services. High school students are reminded they can reserve and check out their summer reading books...and everyone is invited to borrow a CD or book and relax and read in the new outdoor chairs or by one of the cozy indoor spaces near the picture windows overlooking the lovely spring sights of our beautiful borough. Our library is so much more than books; it is a place to read, listen, view, explore, learn, gather, and engage with others.

<u>Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission and Your Local</u> <u>Board of Health</u>

Who is the local health department, what do they do, how are they related to the Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission and the local Board of Health? Simply stated, the Commission is your local health department and the Commission staff works



for your local Board of Health to benefit you the members of the community. More specifically, the Health Department is governed by a volunteer Board of Health that is mandated by state statute and is required to meet certain standards set by the New Jersey State Department of Health. The Board has the legal obligation to assess the health needs of the community and to adopt or recommend adoption of local policies specific to the needs of the community. The Board of Health is also a member of the Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission, a shared service between Bridgewater, Green Brook, Warren, and Watchung whose mission is to improve the health of our community and environment through the use of prevention services, health promotion and protection strategies. The bottom line is we all work together to improve the health of the communities we live and work in.

The Board of Health accomplishes its goals through the work of the Health Department staff; the Health Officer, Environmental Health Specialists, Health Educators, Nurses, Outreach Coordinator, Infectious Disease Preventionists, and Administrative Staff/ Registrars.

The mission noted above is advanced by educating and informing the public and business community about various topics such as healthy lifestyles and behaviors, proper food handling, emergency preparedness, septic systems and wells. Improving child and adult health is accomplished by providing various services such as childhood immunizations, well-baby checkups, cancer screenings and education, blood pressure screenings, and wellness counseling.

Many of these services are provided through contracts and collaboration with our public health partners such as Community Visiting Nurse Association. Environmental health services and enforcement activities are also provided by the department. We inspect establishments and enforce sanitary and environmental laws related to wells, septic systems, restaurants, recreational bathing, youth camps, and body art, among others. We also respond to questions and complaints about mosquito control, hazardous materials, suspect rabid animals and other public health threats. A traditional and continual activity of the department is constant monitoring for communicable disease, investigating disease reports and intervening to stop their spread when identified.

The truth is we believe virtually everything is related to your health and the health of our community and therefore are willing and eager to talk to you about anything. If we do not know the answer, we will refer you to an appropriate resource. So, contact us as soon and often as you like. We look forward to it! We can be reached at our local offices or by email, all of which can be found on our website at www.middlebrookhealth.org.

Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission to Provide Infection Control Training

The Middle Brook Regional Health Commission (MBRHC) has received a grant from the New Jersey Association of County and City Health Officials to support collaboration with long term care and other healthcare facilities to advance infection control practices. MBRHC staff will participate in the Strike Team Infection Control Train the Trainer, a program designed to provide trainings, education, and tools regarding infection prevention and control practices. This will provide foundational knowledge of infection prevention and control measures emphasizing the importance of proper implementation measures and protocols in healthcare settings. The program aims to strengthen confidence in applying infection prevention and control principles to protect staff, patients, and the healthcare community from infectious disease. Two MBRHC team members, Eze Udensi, MD and Megan Romanovich, MPH have been trained through the Strike Team Infection Control Train the Trainer program and are looking forward to passing on the information to help facilities combat the spread of disease. They will be reaching out shortly to offer trainings and look forward to passing in this valuable information to our partners in the community. Radon Awareness

Radon is an odorless, tasteless, and invisible gas that occurs naturally when uranium and radium break down in the soil and in rock formations. Radon gas moves up through the soil and finds its way into homes through cracks in the foundation and openings around pumps, pipes, and drains. Radon occurs in higher concentrations in certain areas of the state, including Somerset County.

Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer in nonsmokers and the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States. Radon is associated with approximately 22,000 lung cancer deaths each year in the United States. Smokers and people exposed to second-hand smoke have a greater risk of developing lung cancer if they are also exposed to excess radon. Radon does not cause any immediate symptoms, such as asthma or respiratory problems, so testing for radon is the only way to know if a home has elevated radon levels.

To reduce the risk of exposure to radon gas, residents are urged to test their homes Even if your neighbor's home is not affected by radon gas, it does not mean that your home is in an acceptable range. If a radon test indicates a radon problem, radon mitigation systems can be installed at a cost similar to other home repairs, reducing exposures and the risk of lung cancer. In an effort to facilitate radon testing the Commission tries to maintain a limited number of radon test kits. Please contact us for current availability of the test kits.

Rabies Clinic

The **Middle-Brook Regional Health Commission**, with the Warren Township Board of Health, will likely be offering one rabies clinic this spring. All residents are encouraged to have their dog or cat vaccinated against rabies. Rabies has already been identified in the state and several cases were identified last year in the towns of the Commission. In order to protect yourself and your pets it is

essential that all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies. If your pet has never been vaccinated against rabies or the vaccination has expired now is the time! **The clinic is free to all and tentatively planned as follows.**

Friendly Reminder... Taxes are due quarterly on: May 1st, August 1st and November 1st

Please remember that Sewer Bills are due in July and are typically NOT paid by your mortgage company. Any accounts delinquent as of December 2022, including Special Assessments will be included in our Tax Sale this fall. Balances can be viewed and paid online at www.watchungnj.gov.

Please note that if you use Bill Pay through your bank, it may take a week or more for the Tax Office to receive the payment. Even though your bank account shows the money being withdrawn on the date that you initiate the bill pay, the bank prints and mails a check to the Borough which delays the process. For this reason, we recommend using the payment process provided on our website or dropping a check off at Borough Hall. If you leave a payment in the drop box outside of the Tax Office, the payment will be credited to your account the next business day.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT



The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as

fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. CERT offers a consistent nationwide approach to volunteer training and organization that professional responders can rely on during disaster situations, which allows them to focus on more complex tasks. Through CERT, the capabilities to prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters is built and enhanced.

The CERT Basic Course training includes:

Disaster Preparedness: Addresses hazards specific to the community. Materials cover actions that participants and their families take before, during and after a disaster as well as an overview of CERT and local laws governing volunteers.

Fire Suppression: Covers fire chemistry, hazardous materials, fire hazards and fire suppression strategies. However, the thrust of this session is the safe use of fire extinguishers, controlling utilities and extinguishing a small fire.

Medical Operations Part I: Participants practice diagnosing and treating airway obstruction, bleeding and shock by using simple triage and rapid treatment techniques.

Medical Operations Part II: Covers evaluating patients by doing a head-to-toe assessment, establishing a medical treatment area and performing basic first aid.

Light Search and Rescue Operations: Participants learn about search and rescue planning, size-up, search techniques, rescue techniques and rescuer safety.

Psychology and Team Organization: Covers signs and symptoms that might be experienced by the disaster victim and workers, and addresses CERT organization and management.

Course Review and Disaster Simulation: Participants review and practice the skills that they have learned during the previous six sessions in a disaster activity.

Free CERT training is offered to Somerset County residents at the Somerset County Training Academy, Hillsborough, NJ. For further information, please email Watchung CERT at: watchungcert@ watchungnj.gov

All residents are urged to utilize their leaves as compost; however, should any resident in a rural area desire pickup of leaves in **BIODEGRADABLE PAPER BAGS ONLY**, call the office of Public Works at **908-756-0080**, **ext. 214**. Due to the State's Stormwater Regulations, the Borough has an ordinance **prohibiting** placement of leaves in the street.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

Happy spring to all from the Environmental Commission! We hope everyone is enjoying the beautiful weather and spending lots of time outdoors. Here are some tips you can use to help keep Watchung green:

TREES: Trees are one of Watchung's most valuable assets. A permit is required to cut down any tree in Watchung, dead or alive. Permits are FREE and can be found on the Borough website or by calling the Engineering Office at 908-756-0091. In addition to enhancing the natural beauty of our town, trees help prevent soil erosion and runoff, clean the air, provide habitat and food for wildlife, and keep our homes cool. Many trees are being lost to invasive insects, disease, and storms. Please consider these factors when thinking about removing trees, and if you must remove them, **please replant!** New trees will benefit Watchung now and far into the future.

MORE TREES! Taking measures to maintain healthy trees can save a tree's life. This includes **hiring an arborist**. Professional, trained arborists know how to properly maintain trees for the safety of the public and the health of the tree. To find an arborist, visit **TreesAreGood.org** for free tools. The "Find an Arborist" tool can help you locate an arborist. The "Verify a Credential" tool enables you to confirm an arborist's ISA credentials. (This info comes from the International Society of Arborculture site treesaregood.org)



<u>RECYCLING</u>: BOOKS can be recycled 24/7 in the bright green bin located along the driveway of the Firemen's Exempt Hall. Hardcover, paperback, and textbooks in good condition are all acceptable. Books must have an ISBN barcode. Books in good condition can also be donated to the Watchung Public Library (barcode not required). **STYROFOAM can now be**

recycled in Watchung. Watch the Borough website and Watchung Facebook pages for details. Save your Styrofoam for recycling! Keeping it out of waterways and landfills helps wildlife and the environment.

ORGANIC LANDSCAPING: Avoid using herbicides on your lawn and garden. They may kill the weeds but they also kill



the beneficial insects that live in your yard, and they are toxic to the environment. Tell your landscaping company you don't want chemicals (glyphosate) on your lawn. In hilly Watchung, when it rains, whatever is on your lawn washes down into your neighbors' yards and ultimately into our streams and lakes, polluting the water and aquatic life.

Try this recipe for organic weedkiller – it's cheap, easy to make, and it works! Use 1 gallon of white vinegar, 1 cup of table salt, and 1 tablespoon of liquid dishwashing soap. Blend thoroughly in a bucket and then funnel the solution into a spray bottle. Apply on a dry, sunny day. Carefully spray all parts of the targeted weeds thoroughly and they'll die within a week.

RAIN GARDENS: Rain Gardens can help improve our lakes and streams and minimize local flooding. A rain garden is a shallow area filled with native plants that receives stormwater from an impervious area such as a roof or driveway. The stormwater is absorbed by the plants in the rain garden, reducing the amount of stormwater pollution that enters our waterways. Lastly, rain gardens also provide much-needed beneficial habitat for birds and pollinators.

If you are interested in seeing a rain garden in action, visit the new Bayberry School rain garden (during non-school hours). You can also google "UConn Rain Garden App" for a **step-by-step guide to installing your own rain garden**.



Planting native trees and shrubs, reducing, reusing, and recycling, and avoiding pesticides and herbicides are some of the best things you can do for Watchung's environment!


