

FROM YOUR MAYOR

Dear Residents of Watchung,

As I make final revisions to this newsletter I am sitting outside – it is March and it is over sixty degrees in the sun. Could it be groundhog Phil is correct and Spring is on its way?

Let me review with you several of the many activities currently underway in town. The Mayor and Council, with good attendance from the public, met in February with architect Anthony Iovino from Arcari + Iovino, P.C., who provided several high level designs regarding potential changes to our library: options ranging from doing what is minimally required to bring the library up to current code as it relates to certain things like, accessibility or required maintenance; other options provide increasingly more substantive change, such as greater efficiency and flexibility in the use of library space over time, as well as more structurally sustainable building.

Significant library changes will require a greater investment. Your mayor continues to believe that without a "center of town" (e.g., Westfield), there is *even greater need and value* to our residents to invest appropriately in a library which is then better enabled to become a valued source of learning, as well a centerpiece of the community in terms of social interaction and pride. A high-functioning library with a strong presence actually helps maintain or increases the assessed value of our homes (strong schools, active recreation areas, and a vibrant library are often seen as strong home buying/selling differentiators) relative to those in neighboring towns.

Standard & Poor's recently provided an extremely strong financial report on Watchung Borough; the municipality clearly demonstrated that it has been extremely well managed as it relates to its finances, and the future looks very strong for Watchung. In a related proactive consolidation of debt, the Borough secured impressively a very low bond interest rate (2.23%) which will result in considerably less interest payments, a savings of over One Million Dollars to our residents.

On March 17th, the Council introduced the 2016 Municipal Budget, again within the 2% State mandated levy cap. It is scheduled for public hearing and adoption on April 21st. As always, the public is welcome to attend and comment. Copies of the proposed budget are available upon request at Borough Hall in the Clerk's Office, or can be viewed on-line from the Borough's webpage.

Watchung continues to look for ways to minimize the impact of affordable housing development. As you might be aware, COAH (Council On Affordable Housing) was disbanded last year, now placing the burden on regional State judiciary appointees to decide what should be Watchung's fair share obligation to build affordable housing in the future. If not carefully defended, an unfair burden of affordable housing units on Watchung could fundamentally change the landscape of the town (schools, traffic, other services). Your Mayor and Council are actively pursuing opportunities to demonstrate Watchung's very limited capacity to build affordable housing.

I personally have been spending time working in collaboration with almost 20 Mayors from other towns in the area, all of whom are impacted by the potential Pilgrim Pipeline installation, a 178 mile, bi-directional pipeline, running between Albany, NY and Linden, NJ, including Watchung (crude oil would be transported south to Linden, be refined and be piped back to Albany as finished products). Most towns affected, including Watchung, have provided impact studies demonstrating potential dangers and hazards of having a highly combustible pipeline buried in our town, largely alongside PSE&G pipelines (PSE&G has reiterated its stance against the pipeline). Pilgrim recently applied for permits in New York State. I am working with other Mayors to prevent the same from happening in New Jersey. This consortium of local officials is looking to secure collective legal and environmental counsel to protect our towns.

How can you help in preventing the pipeline in our borough? Our residents who live in proximity to the proposed pipeline installation through Watchung have every legal right to refuse Pilgrim from surveying their land, a requirement for permitting. You also can write to Public Service, and New Jersey state legislators (Bramnick, Munoz, Kean, Christie, Sweeney, Prieto), as well as Congressman Lance and the Bureau of Public Utilities (BPU) to voice your concerns. We will post contact information on the Borough's website. Your voice can make a difference.


At this writing, Mayor and Council have received two informative reviews/analyses performed by The Rodgers Group (a consultant on matters of fire safety and management) which takes a look at long term equipment/apparatus and operations needs of the Watchung Fire Department. We had a public meeting in March with the Rodgers Group to discuss these reports and recommendations. These studies, in conjunction with architectural plans for potential renovations to the Fire Department building, provide good insight into improvements that are both necessary and optional.

9/11 Memorial plans are starting to take shape. Our town engineer is now working with our 9/11 Memorial Committee to finalize an exact location. The town is mobilizing to create final designs and plans for construction. Be on the lookout in your mailboxes for information on how you can help. The Committee is planning several fund raising events such as "A Taste of Watchung" and others that will be fun for the community and at the same time, support this very important memorial.

The following roads are planned for roadway resurfacing: Cardinal Drive, Ellisen Road, Redmont Road and Valley Drive. Additional roads are also under consideration.

Watchung also is preparing for other important events of possible interest, including Operation Pride April 2, Little League Opening Day April 9, Green Fair April 30, Memorial Day picnic May 21; May 22 rain date, and Memorial Day Service May 30. We welcome you to attend and participate in these events!

The Watchung Rescue Squad continues to fulfill its mission to provide fast and professional emergency medical services to the residents, businesses and visitors to the Borough of Watchung and the surrounding areas.

In 2015, the Watchung Rescue Squad responded to 349 emergency calls. Our top responders for the year were Adam Wexler, Alison Diecke and Ben Dorkin.

WRS also had the chassis of our ambulance 82 replaced as opposed to purchasing an entirely new ambulance. This saved a great deal of money, allowing our organization to optimize the generous donations provided by the residents.

Each year, in addition to providing emergency coverage to the borough, the Watchung Rescue Squad participates in a wide variety of events, both locally as well as in conjunction with the surrounding towns. These events include side by side training with the Watchung Fire Department, the CERT team and as well as medical standby's for town gatherings and athletic events.

Watchung's Green Team continues to work hard toward sustainability efforts. The members of the team were busy last year with the relocation of the Watchung Farmer's Market. In addition to Watchung's Fall Farmer's Market, the Green Team sponsored a From Our Farms workshop at the Watchung Library in December of 2015. The From Our Farms is a project, offered through Rutgers Co-operative Extension that teaches chil-

dren about the importance of good nutrition and the value of local agriculture.

The Team is currently focusing on planning the 2016 Green Fair. The Watchung Green Team is proud of the collaborative effort with the Warren Green Team and Somerset County Planning Board in hosting this year's joint Green Fair scheduled for April 30, 2016, 10:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. at Bayberry Elementary School. ZIKA VIRUS DISEASE



Zika virus disease (Zika) is a disease caused by Zika virus that is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected mosquito. The most common symptoms are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting for several days to a week after being bitten by an infected mosquito. People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of Zika. For this reason, many people might not realize they have been infected. Once a person has been infected, he or she is likely to be pro-

tected from future infections.

In May 2015, the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) issued an alert regarding the first confirmed Zika virus infection in Brazil and on Feb 1, 2016, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared Zika virus a public health emergency of international concern (PHEIC). Local transmission has been reported in many other countries and territories. This virus likely will continue to spread to new areas.

Zika is mostly spread through the bite of infected mosquitoes. It can also spread from a pregnant mother to her baby during pregnancy or around the time of birth. There have also been reports of sexual transmission. There have been reports of a severe birth defect called microcephaly (abnormally small head and a brain that is not fully developed) born to mothers who were infected with the virus during pregnancy. More studies are planned to better understand exactly what problems might happen as a result of the virus.

CDC RECOMMENDS SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS FOR PREGNANT WOMEN AND WOMEN TRYING TO BECOME PREGNANT

Pregnant women in any trimester should consider postponing travel to areas where Zika virus is spreading. Pregnant women who do travel to one of these areas should talk to their doctor first and strictly follow steps to avoid mosquito bites during the trip. Women whose partner has traveled to an area where Zika is present should abstain from sex, or correctly and consistently use condoms for all sex acts, throughout the remainder of the pregnancy. See your doctor if you are pregnant and have traveled, or plan to travel, to an area where the virus is present.

Finally, no local mosquito-borne Zika virus disease cases have been reported in US states, but there have been travelassociated cases. As we rapidly approach the spring and summer, prevention of mosquito breeding becomes more important and aids in preventing other mosquito borne diseases such as West Nile Virus. Eliminating the presence of standing and stagnant water can go a long way to reducing the mosquito population, yet stagnant water can collect in many places around the home, such as bird baths, empty ceramic pots, discarded tires, buckets, clogged rain gutters, and plastic wading pools to name a few.

You can stop water from becoming stagnant by replacing water in your birdbaths every couple of days. You can reduce the possibility of pooling water by disposing of tin cans, plastic containers, ceramic pots and other water-holding containers that are outside. Clean and chlorinate swimming pools. Turn over plastic wading pools, wheelbarrows, and buckets when not in use. Aerate ornamental pools, or stock them with fish. By using these simple control measures you can help reduce the population of mosquitoes around your home and will be more able to enjoy the spring and summer months!

BOND SALE FOR \$8.17 MILLION VERY SUCCESSFUL SALE YIELDS INTEREST RATE OF 2.23%

The Borough conducted a bond sale in the amount of \$8.17 million on February 18th and the results were very positive for the residents as an interest rate of 2.23% was secured. The Mayor and Council unanimously approved a resolution on January 21st consolidating bond ordinances that had been approved since the latter part of 2007 enabling the Borough to conduct this sale on February 18th. The low bid was submitted by Roosevelt and Cross, Inc. Four (4) additional bids were submitted and the highest bid from RBC Capital Markets was 2.628%. The last Borough bond sale was conducted in 2007 for \$15.6 million yielding an interest rate of 4.34% which was very competitive also for market conditions at that time.

For this February bond sale the Borough was rated by the rating agency of Standard and Poor's (S&P). The rating given to the Borough by S&P was AA positive. This rating helped to impact the very strong bids that were obtained by the Borough for this February 18th sale.

Over the course of the life of this bond sale which is sixteen (16) years the Borough will make total interest payments of \$1,808,175. By receiving a low bid of 2.23%, hundreds and hundreds of thousands of dollars in interest rate payment savings were achieved for the residents and taxpayers of Watchung. The timing on hitting the permanent financing market and conducting this bond sale was excellent. Borough officials were concerned that over the next twelve (12) to eighteen (18) months interest rates would gradually start to climb even if only incrementally.

Bond ordinances are considered by the Mayor and Council for major capital improvement projects that should be financed over the long term. Some examples of capital improvement bond ordinances consolidated into the February 18th bond sale included numerous roadway improvements, sanitary sewer installations, public building enhancements/improvements, the purchase of some Public Works equipment such as trucks and heavy equipment, and fire apparatus.









POLICE NEWS

It may be cold and dreary now, but Spring is here and as many of us look forward to getting back to doing all of the things that we enjoy doing outdoors, don't forget that burglars are anxiously awaiting the return of spring as well. When the warmer weather arrives trees and flowers will be in full bloom and while most of us will simply appreciate the scenery, burglars appreciate how it helps to conceal their activities. There is certainly no shortage when it comes to the creative ways that someone will try to take advantage of you, but there are a few simple steps that you can take to avoid becoming a victim of a burglary or some of the more common scams that are reported to the police.

When securing your home the one thing you must realize is that while burglarproof may be ideal, it is not realistic. The question is can you secure your home enough to make the burglar go somewhere else? Below is a list of simple steps that you can take to secure your home enough so that it is not an easy target.

- -Lock your doors.
- -Secure windows that can be easily reached or accessed without a ladder.
- -If your house has an alarm system, use it.
- -Put exterior and interior lights on timers.
- -Put exterior lights on motion sensors.
- -Stop mail and newspaper delivery when traveling.
- -Trim overgrown vegetation that helps to conceal a burglar's attempted entry.
- -Tell neighbors of your travel plans, advise them if anyone will visit the house while you're gone, and ask them to check on things while you're away.
- -Lock your car, keep valuables out of sight, and remove keys and key fobs from vehicles.

Don't hesitate to report any unusual or suspicious activity to the police right away. No one knows your neighborhood better than you do, so if you see something that just doesn't seem right, report it to the police immediately. Have you ever seen a contractor's vehicle that didn't have the company name and phone number plastered all over it? If someone knocks on your door offering some type of home improvement service and you didn't call them first, that should be your first indication that something may be going on. If you don't see a truck with the company name all over it, then something is wrong. Remember that most burglaries are random, and chances are a stranger is knocking on your door simply to see if anyone is home, or if the house is vacant. Once they see that the house is occupied, offering home improvement services is nothing more than a convenient explanation for knocking on your door. Since you are at home, chances are that one of your neighbors is about to have their house burglarized. Many of the cases we've solved over the years were the result of someone who called the police immediately when they received a strange knock on their door. Don't dismiss those unsolicited inquiries. Call the police immediately and let us investigate.

Unfortunately, it doesn't end with simply securing your home and you must remain vigilant when it comes to the various types of scams that are used to defraud innocent victims. Scam artists often pose as representatives of government agencies while preying on your fears and emotions. You may receive calls or emails from the "IRS" requesting money for taxes and threatening arrest if payment is not made immediately. The IRS and other government agencies do not operate that way, and you should always make every effort to verify the call and the caller before sending any money. Please keep this in mind as we enter tax season, and go to www.irs.gov under their "News & Events" tab for additional information.

The same is true if anyone calls demanding some type of immediate payment. Whether it's someone purporting to be from the IRS, or some law enforcement agency requesting bail money for a family member DO NOT wire any payment or provide any bank account or credit card information without verifying the authenticity of the call first. Legitimate agencies will not threaten you with consequences for failing to act immediately. Ask questions, takes names, titles and callback numbers and in many cases a quick internet search on the names and numbers you've gathered will reveal the scam. Most of these scams are initiated from out of the country, so recovering lost funds and prosecuting those offenders is extremely rare. Don't be a victim.


